Dear Alex,

On the morning of January 23rd, 2018, a 15-yr old student brought a shotgun to school and opened fire towards a crowd of students. Bailey Holt and Preston Cope, both 15, were killed. Twenty-one others were injured, including fourteen who were shot.

That school was Marshall County High School (MCHS) in Benton, KY - the site of our country's most recent school shooting prior to Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School in Parkland, FL.

Students and school employees said that in the wake of such an unspeakable tragedy, many people made promises to the students, the school and the community. However, time passed and many of those promises were never kept.

Alex Sheen, Founder of *because I said I would*, visited MCHS on April 9th to speak at an assembly for all students, teachers, and staff about the importance of promises made *and* kept.

When MCHS students and teachers returned from their spring break to make their final push towards the end of the school year - and, for some, their high school graduation - school administrators wanted that push to begin with Alex's inspirational message.

"You have gone through an unspeakable tragedy that I'm not going to stand up here and pretend I understand," Alex Sheen said. "It's not fair, and it never needed to happen. But maybe it is a moment to reflect on our purpose, to make a promise in honor of someone we have lost."

9.81 million Promise Cards have been distributed to over 153 countries. By request only.


